	University of Leeds Reading lists diversification is a much-debated topic with many critiques. This research aims to take a more holistic approach to this issue and develop a skill- based approach. This approach to diversification of reading lists will centre the question of how to 'operationalise' diversity in a way that intersects with pedagogy and goes beyond superficial definitions. It hopes to address the issue that diversity in academic texts requires an approach that acknowledges the inherent power hierarchies. The central, practical aim is to approach diversifying reading lists as a 'literacy skill' in terms of how we view and engage with texts, and to embed this in pedagogical practices.
